K-Kids

In K-Kids clubs worldwide, more than 36,000 children are learning leadership through service. Currently, 26 Lincoln 5th grade students serve as K -Kids. They're taking on the responsibility of running a K-Kids club as they plan and participate in community service projects. They assist the elderly with chores or organize community food drives. They serve their schools, raising funds for sports equipment and extracurricular actives. In big and small ways, they're changing the world around them. But the most significant change happens in the kids themselves.



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Making Progress-Illinois School Report Card and PARCC

In the fall of each year, Illinois schools receive the results of their Spring PARCC assessment. Students and school scores become available publically on Oct. 31.

The 2018 PARCC results for Lincoln's 3rd, 4th and 5th gr. students in Eng/Language Arts (ELA) and Math (MA) are discussed below:

Overall, Lincoln recorded a meet and exceeds rate of 37%. It represents a 4% increase over spring 2017. <u>Twenty one more</u> <u>students met or exceeded state</u> <u>standards over the previous year.</u>

Third grade students scored a 36% average in ELA matching the state average, but below the district avg. of 44%. In math, third grade students met/exceeded

at a rate of 46% (7 pts. above 2017) exceeding the state average of 37%.

In ELA fourth grade students had a M/E average of 38% matching the state average of 38% and just below a district average of 43%. Fourth grade students also recorded a M/E average of 36%, above the state average of 31%, but below the district average of 42%.

In fifth grade, 2017-18 students met and exceeded at 35% in ELA missing the state average by 1% below the district averages of 49%. Fifth grade student had a math M/E average of 29% below the district average of 40% and missing the state average again by 1 point. Lincoln's Spring 2018 PARCC scores reflect an increase in student achievement over the 2017 scores in 5 of 6 grade tested levels/subject categories.

Attendance Matters:

Student attendance matters for academic performance – The association between poor attendance and lower National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) scores is robust and holds for every state and for each of the 21 urban districts, regardless of size, region or composition of the student population.

Poor attendance is a national challenge - About one in five students in both fourth and eighth grade reported missing three or more days in the month before the test. If that pattern persisted all year, the students would have missed 27 days or 15% of the school year. *About 3 percent of students missed 10 or more days in the prior month, a level of absenteeism associated with the weakest scores.

For younger students, research

has shown that chronic absenteeism in kindergarten is associated with lower achievement in reading and math in later grades,

even when controlling for family income, race, disability status, and preschool experience. Research finds a pattern across grades – namely chronic absenteeism is high in kindergarten, drops to the lowest rates around fourth and fifth grade, and then climbs steadily through middle school and high school to peak at 12th grade.

Preliminary data from a California study found that children who were chronically absent in kindergarten and first grade were less likely to read proficiently at the end of 3rd grade. If children don't show up for school regularly they miss out on fundamental reading and math skills and the chance to build a habit of good attendance that will carry them into college and careers.

You can help us achieve a building attendance rate of **96%** by having your child arrive to school by 8:00 AM *(signing students in late or signing them out early counts against your student's attendance record and the school's overall attendance rate)* when possible schedule outside appointments after 3:00 PM, and continue to build healthy habits and routines for them at home to ensure they are ready for school each day.

Lincoln Elementary implements a school-wide Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) program to decrease problem behaviors & increase instructional time. Lincoln has achieved GOLD Level Recognition from the Midwest PBIS Network the past 5 years. We track our Office Discipline Referrals (ODR's) using the School-Wide Information System (SWIS).

Our PBIS Team meets monthly to create weekly "Wildcat Way" lesson plans to target student ODR's. Some of the scheduled 2nd quarter "Wildcat Ways" include; We speak at appropriate times, We play fairly, We speak kindly to each other, We keep our hands to ourselves. These lessons are taught each week by classroom

teachers and by our K-Kids on Wildcat TV.

Please partner with us at home by teaching/discussing school-wide expectations (Be Respectful, Be Responsible, Be Safe) and asking your child about the weekly "Wildcat Way" (discuss positive examples vs. negative examples). Together we can make a positive difference!
