The process of qualifying for state remains the same as other groups, with each competitor having to qualify through regional and sectional rounds by placing in the top 4 and the top 3, respectively. 9 people from MHS qualified to go to sectionals, where the competition was fierce. Eventually, Bwalya and Connor both placed second in their events, qualifying them to go to state.

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MHS DANCE COMPETES AT NATIONALS AND STATE

On January 31, the MHS Varsity Dance team embarked on a trip to compete at UDA Nationals for the first time in 16 years, the last team to compete being in 2002. Boarding a bus at 4 am on Thursday morning, the group of 18 girls made their way to Nashville to board a plane to Orlando, FL. The team landed in Disney with a competitive mindset, something that was vital to their success, considering they were to be the very first team to dance on the floor. Kicking off the entire UDA competition, the MHS Dance team competed in the Kick division at 9 am Friday morning. The team placed 9th in their pool of 25 and were 6 points away from the first place recipients. Following the competition, girls had the opportunity to visit Disney's Animal Kingdom and Hollywood Studios during Extra Magic Hours.

But their hard work paid off, the team competing on Saturday morning in the Pom Dance category where they placed 11th in their pool of 24.

Not only did the team have fun at Magic Kingdom and Epcot, but they just so happened to be there at the same time Tom Brady was celebrating his 6th Super Bowl win. Some of the girls had a front row seat to the Super Bowl parade, which excited many at home and on social media.

Not only did the team compete at Nationals, but the very same week they arrived home at 2 am on Tuesday morning and performed at a MHS Boys Basketball game, PLUS competing at IDTA State that weekend.
