State assessments are aligned to the Illinois' learning standards and aimed to deliver clear and timely information about what students know, can do, and whether they can demonstrate the academic preparation necessary to succeed as citizens and in college and careers.

The tests seek to assess what matters in today's world. The assessment system not only measures mastery of English Language Arts, Mathematics, Social Studies & Science knowledge, but also uses technology to include questions and tasks that mirror the type of work students will encounter both in their current classrooms and post high school.

The authentic assessments invite students to think deeply and construct their own solution to challenging tasks and situations. The assessments require students to analyze information and explain their answers; therefore, better reflecting classroom lessons and experiences. At the conclusion of the tests, students may be asked to provide feedback about the assessment.

As always, we want your child to perform his or her best. You can help your child do this by:

- 1. making sure, if possible, that your child attends school on the days of testing;
- 2. making sure your child gets a good night's sleep the night before testing;
- 3. providing breakfast on the mornings of testing;
- 4. reminding your child to ask the teacher questions if he or she does not understand the test directions;
- 5. letting your child know that you have confidence in his or her ability to do their best; and
- 6. advising your child <u>not to worry</u> about the test-just do the best he or she can.
